During the past year, we have seen new floral planters and benches installed on Broadmark Parade to replace one of the aged Wooden Planters, and it is hoped that the other Planter in close proximity will soon be replaced, courtesy of a financial contribution from both the Rustington In-Bloom Committee and the Council. New bespoke signage is now proudly in place at the five main entry points to the Village, thanks to

funding received from the Developer of the new Retail Park on the A259, which is currently still under construction.

Once again there were excellent achievements for the Village in the South and South East in Bloom and Loo of the Year Competitions, and the first Street Fayre, which replaced the Carnival and Grand Fete, was an outstanding success. The Christmas Lighting Scheme was enhanced even further, and the Christmas Shopping Event was a festivity enjoyed by all!

Rustington Street Fayre

Following the success of the first Rustington Street Fayre last year, this year's event on Saturday 18 June will be bigger and better. The Littlehampton District Lions Club and the Rustington Chamber of Trade and Commerce have organised a day of events in the centre of the Village, with support from the Rustington Parish Council, Store Property Investments Limited and Holt Publishing.

Churchill Parade will be closed to traffic all day and local Charities and non-profit groups will have stalls to raise money for their respective

causes. A Children's Fair will be there and a stage set up in the Methodist Church Garden for local groups and musicians to entertain everyone. Churchill Court will also be used for entertainment. Acts booked are The Silhouettes, Liz Angioni, Joe Butt, The Bamboo Band, and Marky Wild the Magician. Rustington Methodist Church Hall will again host an Arts and Craft Event similar to last year. The Rustington Museum will be holding a Vintage Victorian Carry on History Day with dressing up, children's events and tea and biscuits.

Our intention is to make the day

a fun day for the Village and local community, whilst helping local charities and groups raise funds for their respective causes.

Any proceeds made on the day will be divided equally between Cancer United, a local cancer support group and Worthing First Responders.

Annual Report from the Chairman of the Council

I cannot believe that it is almost a year since I was elected to the post of Chairman of the Council. I hope that I have

served the Council well and carried out my duties in the best interests of the community and the Village. I have really enjoyed the challenge! The role of the Council is certainly varied, with never a dull moment, and no time to rest on your laurels, wondering what to do next!

I would like to thank the people who have supported not only me, but the Council, in continuing with its efforts to achieve all of its on-going objectives.

To start, my thanks go to Councillor Jamie Bennett, the Vice-Chairman, who has provided unceasing support throughout my first term as Chairman. And, to all of my fellow Councillors, who work diligently and voluntarily, all for the benefit of the local community as a whole.

I would also like to thank all of the District Councillors who represent Rustington and regularly attend the Council Meetings, to keep the Council fully informed on all District Council matters relating to Rustington.

Special thanks also go to Graham Tyler, our main County Council representative, who provides Reports on County Council matters, and ensures that the voice of Rustington is heard, when necessary, at County Hall. And, Dr James Walsh, who represents a small part of the Village.

I will now provide you with a brief outline of each of the Council's Committees, but I would like to mention some of the Projects that the Council either completed or was involved in during the last financial year:-

- Further major repair works have

been undertaken at The Woodlands Centre, including roofing and resurfacing of the floor and stage in the Village Memorial Hall

- New bespoke Village Entry Signs now hold pride of place at the five main entry points to the Village
- Replacement floral planters and benches have also been installed to replace one of the aged wooden planters, courtesy of funding received from Store Property Investments Limited, on Broadmark Parade, outside the Waitrose Store
- Another Defibrillator, donated to the Village by a local resident, is available outside Owen Electrical Limited at the southern end of Woodlands Avenue
- The further enhanced Christmas Lighting Scheme, as part of the three way partnership between the Chamber of Trade and Commerce, Store Property Investments Limited and the Council, was subtle, but as always, most impressive
- The first Village Street Fayre, organised by the Littlehampton District Lions Club in partnership with the Chamber of Trade and Commerce and the Council took place in June and was a resounding success.

A Marketing Event for the recently refurbished building, now known as The Garden Room, was held on 1 April 2016 and was very well attended. It is anticipated that the building, in its most tranquil surroundings, will prove to be another sought after community facility, which is available for all types of private hire. The Council again entered the four Public Toilet Units in the Village in the Loo of the Year Competition. In addition to receiving a Platinum Award for the Churchill Car Park Toilets, and three Gold Awards for the other three Units, two special awards were received. These Awards were the National Category Award for the Best Public Toilets in Car Parks (Churchill Car Park), as well as a Premier League Local Authority Award.

In September 2015, a Gold Award

was achieved in the South and South East in Bloom Competition, together with the Category's Overall Winner Award, for the second year entry into the Village/Town Centre Category, in which we again competed against a number of very large Towns, including East Grinstead, Farnham, Gravesend, Herne Bay, Horley and Sevenoaks. Rustington-in-Bloom again received the Sussex Life County Discretionary Award for the highest marks in Sussex.

The Woodlands Recreation Ground also excelled in the Competition, achieving a Gold Award in the Parks Category.

There were a number of high level Awards for community projects in the 'It's your Neighbourhood' Category, with The Chaucery Memorial, Oakhurst Gardens and The Hidden Twitten receiving 'Outstanding' Awards, the Methodist Church Gardens followed closely with a 'Thriving' Award and the first time entry 'Acorns to Oaks' achieved an 'Establishing' Award.

The Trustees' Discretionary Award was presented to The Oak Community Project, and Courtenay Luscombe of Ferring Nurseries, received the Judges' Special Outstanding Contribution Award.

This goes to show what dedicated and amazing people we have in our community.

And, now, moving on to the Council's Committees.....

Finance and General Purposes

I would like to thank Councillor Don Rogers, for the excellent job he has done again as Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee. Don's own Report in respect of the Council's finances for the years ending 31 March 2016 and 31 March 2017, follows my Report in this Newsletter. My thanks also go to the Members of this Committee.

Leisure and Amenities

Thank you to Councillor Graham Tyler, Chairman of this very important Committee that is responsible for the majority of services provided by the

Council, including the Public Toilets, Public Seats, Noticeboards, Street Maps, Beach and Bus Shelters, some Street Lighting, Grass Cutting in the centre of the Village, the Planting, Design and Maintenance of the Floral /Planted Displays plus any other associated functions.

The Youth Centre and The Woodlands Centre are also managed by this Committee, as are the Woodlands Recreation Ground and Woodland Park Sportsfield. And, finally, the Committee is responsible for the Museum, the Village Information Centre and The Garden Room.

Thanks go to all of its Members.

Planning

The Planning Committee has been ably Chaired by Councillor Bob Grevett for a number of years now.

The Committee is consulted on all Planning Applications within the Parish

by both the Arun District Council, as the Local Planning Authority and, in certain cases, the West Sussex County Council.

Thank you Bob and the Members of the Committee, of course.

Allotments

I would like to thank Councillor Mrs Christine Broomfield, who has also continued to be Chairman of the Allotments Committee, and the Committee Members, for managing the three very popular Allotment Sites.

Emergency Planning

This Committee, Chaired for the first time this year by the Vice-Chairman, Councillor Jamie Bennett, monitors the Council's Emergency Plan, and ensures that procedures are in place for the provision of The Woodlands Centre as a Rest Centre in the event of an emergency.

Thank you Jamie, and your Committee.

The Council is also represented on a number of external Bodies, and has various Working Parties looking at ways of improving the way it works.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Members of the Council's Personnel Team, for without their true commitment and hard work, Rustington's reputation would, I am sure, fail to be what it is today. But special thanks must go to Elaine and Caroline for their support and smooth running of the day to day tasks that most think just happen naturally. And, of course, Carole, the Clerk of the Council, who ensures that every service and function provided by the Council is always carried out to an extremely high standard. In fact, the unceasing diligence by the Council's Personnel Team is a true testament of its commitment to the Village and its community.

Annual Report from the Chairman of the Finance and General

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report in respect of the Council's finances for the past year and looking

forward to the year ending 31 March 2017. To try and make this Report a little more interesting, I have decided this year to only refer to the most significant expenditure items for the previous 12 months and will deal with the forthcoming year in more detail.

A major event during the past year was the Council's decision to close The Garden Café. The Café was sustaining ever increasing losses and this state of affairs could not continue. The Council very much regretted having to take this decision, which I know disappointed many people, but in the end it had no other option. Following some internal alterations, this building is now available for hire as a community facility.

Other significant items of expenditure have included:-

- The management and maintenance of The Woodlands Centre (including the Council Offices), the Youth Centre, the Recreation Ground, the Woodland Park Sportsfield and the various Allotment Sites
- A major refurbishment of the Village Memorial Hall and Stage floor has recently been undertaken
- Management and maintenance of the Village Museum and the Village Information Centre. The latter in partnership with Store Property Investments Limited
- The funding of the Youth Club, operated by ACCelerate
- Street Lighting in Private Roads
- Christmas Lighting in partnership with the Rustington Chamber of Trade and Commerce and Store Property Investments Limited

- Loan Servicing Costs
- Design and Maintenance of all Floral/Planting Displays
- Staffing and Administration
- Maintenance of Public Toilet Units
- Grants to Local Groups and Organisations
- Annual Community Carol Concert and the Civic Service
- Councillors Allowances totalling approximately £7,500.00 (£505.00 - increased to £516.60 per annum with effect from January 2015)
- The production and distribution of the Quarterly Newsletters for residents
- Provision of the new Village Entry Signs funded by a financial contribution from the Developer of the new Retail Park along the A259 New Road.

Turning now to the forthcoming year...

For the past five years, the Council's annual charge on a Band 'D' property has remained largely unaffected at a yearly average of £88.39. The Council, like everyone else, is beset by inflationary pressures and coupled with a final year's reduction in the Arun District Council's Localisation of Council Tax Support Grant, has not found it possible to keep the Parish Precept unchanged. Therefore, this year, a slight increase has been necessary. The Council has set its 2016/17 Precept at £537,000, which means that the annual Parish Council charge on a Band 'D' property in Rustington will be £90.04, an increase of £2.27 over the previous year. The total Band 'D' charge equates to £1.73 per week.

However, the Council will continue to strive to achieve ever improved efficiency and value for money in its operation, whilst doing its best to maintain, and improve, where possible, the range of local services that are so appreciated by residents and visitors alike. As District and County Councils are in the process of endeavouring to reduce their own expenditures, this could result in the

possible devolvement of some local services to Parish and Town Councils. Obviously, this would have significant implications for the Parish Council's own expenditure requirements.

Existing local services include The Woodlands Centre, Woodlands Recreation Ground, Youth Centre and the Woodland Park Sportsfield. The Council funds the Museum and the Village Information Centre. The latter service, the Information Centre, is currently subsidised by a financial contribution from Store Property Investments Limited.

Further local services include over 150 Allotment Plots spread over three sites, some 75 Public Seats, Bus and Beach Shelters, four Public Toilet sites, a School Crossing Patrol and some 44 Street Lights situated in Private Roads.

A further local service that is very successful and much appreciated is the continued enhancement of the numerous floral displays in the central shopping area and at other sites within the Parish. As part of the Council's partnership with local Groups and Organisations, the Council, in this instance, acknowledges the valuable assistance and cooperation received from the Rustington-in-Bloom Committee.

The Council contributes to the three way partnership with the Rustington Chamber of Trade and Commerce and Store Property Investments Limited which provides the Christmas Lighting Scheme, which was again enhanced for 2015.

As part of the Council's assistance to outside Groups and Organisations, Grants have been made to local Clubs and Charitable Organisations. A good example of this is the Council's financial assistance to the organisers of the popular Street Fayre which, this year, is taking place on 18 June.

A further year's financial contribution will be made to Compass Travel to assist with the continuation of the Number 12 Bus service.

The Council intends to continue making a contribution towards the maintenance, general upkeep and

operational costs associated with the CCTV camera situated on the corner of Woodlands Avenue at its junction with The Street.

Other projects planned this year include a new Bus Shelter in front of the Westcourt Medical Centre, which will be much appreciated by patients using this Centre.

It is also hoped that further Information Signage can be provided for visitors to the Village Centre.

Plans for a major upgrading of the rear part of The Woodlands Centre have been put on hold, until sufficient funding has been accumulated for this purpose. However, additional major roof repairs and replacement paving in front of the Village Memorial Hall are planned.

To provide its many and varied local services, the Council has to have a central organisation and significant items of expenditure in this regard, include establishment costs such as staffing, loan servicing, community events including Newsletter publicity, security and public protection, including insurance cover.

I would like to take this opportunity, on behalf of the Council, to express my thanks and appreciation for all the hard work undertaken by all of our Volunteers, who support the Council's Personnel at the Museum and at other Amenity Sites within the Parish.

I believe that the Council provides excellent 'value for money' for its residents and at the same time works in partnership with the local Community to ensure that Rustington continues to be a public spirited vibrant place to live.

I would like to thank all of my fellow Councillors for their continued efforts to achieve and maintain the objectives of the Council.

While the challenges facing the Council will continue and will in all eventuality increase, I can assure you that it will do everything in its power to address these with the benefit to the local community at the forefront of its objectives.

Finally, it would be remiss of me not to thank all Members of the Council's Personnel for their continued hard work and loyalty and, in particular, Caroline Harris who manages so well

the Council's Financial and Accounting Systems and Elaine Lamb for her most efficient organisation of the Council's Administrative operation.
