


The Council has a new Website...

Well here we are again, and another judging day for South and South East in Bloom has come and gone. Our Village looked amazing and the weather was so kind to us, making everything look bright and fresh.

With teams of volunteers litter picking from early morning and Arun District Council's Street Cleansing Department doing a superb job, the Village looked spotless, complimenting the excellent planting designs and displays provided by Ferring Nurseries. The theme this year was Fun and Thoughtfulness, with thought provoking placards, googly eyes and even



'hair' on one of the displays. The new planters in front of the Samuel Wickens Centre, built for us by the Littlehampton & District Men's Shed West were a big 'hit'. The Committee is most grateful to Waitrose, who have kindly sponsored the planting in these planters for the first year, to the tune of £1,000.00.

Everyone who took part and contributed should feel very proud of presenting the Village in the best possible way. I have been involved in 'In-Bloom' for a good many years and this must certainly rank as one of our finest entries. The Village always looks good but rarely could it have looked any better.

During this past year, the Committee has also donated a World War One Commemorative Seat in the Village, and for the Brookside Memorial Garden a seat and pagoda, to help this very worthwhile Project. The Committee would like to thank everyone who has helped with the fund raising, enabling it to achieve this.

The Committee is also delighted that there are now five Community Groups who enter the South and South-East in Bloom 'It's Your

Neighbourhood' Competition. In future years, it would be encouraging if other Neighbourhoods in the Village would decide to develop a small area to enhance that environment. Those Neighbourhoods already involved find that there is a reduction in litter and graffiti, with respect for the area and for those who are involved in the work. Of course, it will not be until mid-September, at the Competition's Awards' Ceremony, that the results will be known, so we will have to keep our fingers crossed until then!

Rustington Museum at the Samuel Wickens Centre



We are well and truly into the long Summer days and the new Museum is progressing well.

For those who have dared to peek through the doors at the Samuel Wickens Centre, you will see that the personnel and collections have moved into the new Museum space. It's a very exciting time, and we are well on the way in finalising the text. The objects have been selected and are being measured for their new cases. With so much history in the Village, it has not been a challenge to find things to include. From Stone Age tools and World War One

Airfields, Tudor Cottages to the modern day - Rustington has it all. There is a Temporary Exhibition space too, so that we can hold a changing programme of displays.

We have also been planning an exciting programme of talks and events to start in November 2019. There will be family activities, evening talks and a series of reminiscence sessions. All will highlight the new displays and the Museum collection. Details of these will be released in September 2019, so keep your diaries handy. The Museum's Facebook Page is also being revisited - search for Rustington Museum. Here you can keep

track of what we are finding in our stores, sneak peeks of the new displays and our forthcoming activities programme.

Volunteers will continue to play an important part of the Museum. There is a fantastic Oral History Team that have been recording the amazing memories of Rustington's residents ready to use in the new displays, but also to be kept for future research. A growing team of Documentation Volunteers are helping to catalogue the collection. We are also looking for volunteers who can help with our forthcoming Reminiscence Sessions.

With training, they will play a key role in the delivery of the sessions, helping to unlock people's stories through the use of the Museum Collection. Stewards will play a most important part in the day-to-day running of the Museum.

Rustington Youth Club



At Rustington Youth Club (delivered by Arun Youth Projects), we believe in inclusion and the importance of ensuring that each young person that enters the Club is introduced to each worker and feels as if they belong.

We encourage our older young people to take a role in supporting newer young people, offering them tours and facilitating a game with their peers.

Although there are many smaller groups of friends within the whole group of attendees, the Youth Team try to make sure that there is positive engagement amongst Members of the Club by playing group games, or having large discussions in the upstairs lounge, about a tricky topic. For example, I sat with some young people recently and opened a discussion about friendship and whether people can be part of one or more groups. This was a useful conversation as it is important to challenge the views of young people on such subjects to ensure they are also being inclusive themselves.

The Club is open 7.00 pm-9.00 pm every Thursday evening including Half-Terms and Summer holidays. It is a venue for young people aged between 11-17 years,

to find help and advice, and a safe place to be, alongside access to games consoles, pool/table tennis, a chill-out space, and arts/crafts. Each week there is also a tuck shop and an ongoing programme including cooking, movie nights, inflatables, theme nights, and sports. The cost of entry is FREE for the first time, then 50p per session. You can also bring a friend to the Club that hasn't been before, and you will BOTH get in for FREE that week.
